"Lenten Grace" by Rev. Holly Cameron

I have been enjoying our Tuesday night gatherings to discuss this year's Lenten devotional. Each week there is a poem, a commentary, and a painting based on the readings for the coming Sunday. Poetry and art often feel like foreign languages to me, so I love getting together with a group to hear what others see in those media. It also helps that each painting is accompanied by a statement by the artist, which gives insight on what they were thinking as they created their artwork.

So far, we have looked at a river of abundant grace that flows all around us, and how most of it rushes right by; we just can't grasp all the grace that God is pouring into the world. We've also looked at a piece that reminds us there are no streetlights out in the ocean, and the depth of darkness in being out on a boat at night. That artist talked about the "luxury of stars," which reminded me of how delighted I was when I moved into the manse 26 years ago. I had been living in Boston, where I saw almost no stars, and when I came here, where there are also no streetlights, I loved sitting outside and looking up at a sky full of stars. It inspired me to travel to several different deserts for a look at even more stars!

Remembering that transition made me think of how often God is offering us beauty, to remind us of the joy in this life. And how often we are focused on our own tasks, so we miss the grace flowing all around us. The Rev. Sarah Speed wrote a poem for this week, called

"Praise the Mount," which seems to express the same idea.

I have stayed quiet before. / I have held my tongue / while passing mountains. / I have slipped my hands deep into pockets. / despite the music that invites me to dance. / I have glimpsed a new moon and a new love / and have acted as if it was something other than / a complete, God-given miracle. / But not today. / Not today. / Today I will dance. / Today I will tap my toes all the way to heaven's gates. / Today I will point out every shade of gold / and periwinkle that we pass. / Today I will talk about my faith like we talk about the / weather — / early and unprompted, comfortable and unashamed. / Today I will tell you that God did such a good job / with freckles, willow trees, / and your entire being. / And I will not be embarrassed by my own conviction. / I will not swallow my praise. / I have stayed quiet before, / but not today. / Today I will sing.

As this Lenten season continues, I hope you have moments of seeing a rainbow, or the sun after the rain, or a night sky of stars, or hearing music or laughter that lightens your heart, and fills you with God's grace.

A Brief Statement of Faith by Larry Dyess, Pastor in the Pew

n 1983, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was formed by the union of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America and the Presbyterian Church in the United States. The two churches worked to clarify the common ground on which they stood as a new denomination. The result was "A Brief Statement of Faith."

I was reminded of the existence of this document when I used the Presbyterian Daily prayer app for February 12, 2024 and was surprised to find a portion of the brief statement within the morning prayers. After reading it I felt a renewed sense of what it means to be the church in today's world. I am sharing with you the section that spoke to me:

We trust in God the Holy Spirit, everywhere the giver and renewer of life.

The Spirit justifies us by grace through faith, sets us free to accept ourselves and to love God and neighbor, and binds us together with all believers in the one body of Christ, the Church.

The same Spirit who inspired the prophets and apostles rules our faith and life in Christ through scripture, engages us through the Word proclaimed, claims us in the water of baptism, feeds us with the bread of life and cup of salvation, and calls women and men to all ministries of the Church.

In a broken and fearful world the Spirit gives us courage to pray without creasing, to witness among all people to Christ as Lord and Savior, to unmask idolatries in Church and culture, to hear the voices of peoples long silenced, and to work with others for justice, freedom and peace.

In gratitude to God, empowered by the Spirit, we strive to serve Christ in our daily tasks and live holy and joyful lives, even as we watch for God's new heaven and new earth praying, "Come, Lord Jesus!"

With believers in every time and place, we rejoice that nothing in life or in death can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. Glory be to the Father, and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit. Amen.

In an age when the focus is so much on us as individuals, it is easy to forget about community. Even in the community of faith, when we gather for worship, I suspect the focus is on going "to church," forgetting that we are individually and together the church. The text reminds us that we are all believers in the one body of Christ, the Church, and we are given work to do in a broken and fearful world.

The Brief Statement of Faith from 1983 has a lot to say to us in 2024. In it we find hope and strength and by taking its wisdom seriously and folding into our daily lives, we can, and I trust will, follow a way forward into lives which are sustained and led by the Spirit.

I have incorporated this Brief Statement of Faith in my daily prayer routine during the Season of Lent because it will aid me in the introspective work we are called to do during this season and then live out through the months beyond Lent.

I invite you to let this text settle down into your heart, mind, and soul as we seek together to be the body of Christ and together do the work we are called to do in a broken and fearful world.

Session Notes

ession held their regular scheduled meeting on February 15, 2024. The following items were discussed:

- The 2023 Church Statistical Report was reviewed and approved. The report was submitted as required on February 15.
- A Congregational Meeting is called for Sunday, February 18, 2024 directly after service. The congregation will vote on a change to the bylaws to have six elders serving on session as opposed to nine.
- Archtop met with members of the congregation and the church's attorney Carolyn Lemmon on February 15, 2024. They walked through the church grounds and placed flags where they would place their structure and discussed the digging for fiber lines. Based on questions raised, Archtop will redraw their plans for the project and have their attorney discuss items with the church attorney. {Note: the week after the Session met, Archtop cancelled the meeting of the attorneys, saying they decided to move in another direction and would no longer be pursuing an easement agreement with our church.}
- The Earth Care Congregation recertification application was reviewed, approved, and submitted as required on February 15, 2024. We are very pleased that the church exceeded the needed point values for recertification.
- Pastor Holly and Dorothy Kohler attended the church growth webinar on January 17, 2024. The webinar was titled "Albany Quick Leap: Grow Your Church in 10 Days." The overall idea is that it is great for churches to engage in activities to bring in neighbors from the community. Events like food drives, barbeques, turkey suppers, etc. are opportunities for connection with our neighbors to make the event a success, and to share their contact information so they can be included in future activities. This should be part of our conversation when we meet with our Presbyterian Foundation Representative on March 9 and we hope everyone will take part in sharing ideas.
- Dorothy Kohler attended the last Presbytery meeting on January 25, 2024. At the meeting it was announced that the West Glens Falls

- Chapel had closed. The Presbytery is sending a Commission to Guatemala in March 2024. Lastly, changes were made at the beginning of 2024 to the health insurance used by retired ministers. They now have Humana, which is creating problems because many practices, including Albany Medical Center, will not accept Humana. Representatives from our Presbytery are working with the Board of Pensions to address this problem.
- A number of Financial reports were reviewed in anticipation of a meeting with our Presbyterian Foundation Representative, Rose Niles. The reports were very detailed and assisted in understanding the church's current financial situation. We agreed to meet with Rose on Saturday, March 9, and encourage anyone an interest in our finances, stewardship, and next steps to join us from 9:00 a.m. to noon.
- This year our church is participating in a joint Lenten study with the Methodist church. The discussions are held every Tuesday at 6:00 pm. Folks can attend in person at the Methodist church or via Zoom.
- New officers will be installed on Sunday, February 25, 2024. Margaret Ewart and Kevin Dwyer will be installed as Elders; Margaret for a second term and Kevin for a first term.
 Debbie Perez and Diana Bremm will be ordained as Deacons, and Carol Fuglein will be installed for a second term as Deacon.
- Beginning February 27, 2024, is the next book discussion on "Inconspicuous Consumption." The group will meet for five Tuesdays at 2:00 pm on Zoom.
- The Automated Defibrillator Device (AED), is in need of a new battery and pads. The cost is approximately \$300.
- Approved allowing school bus to turn around in our parking lot so children who live in the trailer park do not have to cross the street.
- Our church sign at Font Grove Rd is bent around the pole it is attached to. Homer has agreed to remove the sign.
